EVOLUTION OF CO-OPS IN MALAYSIA



- In 1922, thrift and loan co-operatives were introduced to overcome:
 - problems encountered by farmers in the <u>rural areas</u> who were oppressed by middlemen under the "padi kunca" scheme; and
 - indebtedness among public servants in <u>urban areas</u>
- ♣ Followed by formation of different types of co-operatives consumer, agriculture, housing, transportation, industrial, construction and services
- Covers a wide spectrum of membership comprising civil servants, private sector workers, graduates, pensioners, students, women, single mothers, residents of housing estates, fishermen, farmers, professionals etc.





OBJECTIVES AND FUNCTIONS OF MCSC

The **main objectives** of MCSC are:

- ♣ Foster sound and orderly development of the co-operative sector in accordance with co-operative values and principles to contribute towards achieving the socioeconomic objectives of the nation;
- Promote a financially sound, progressive and resilient co-operative sector; and
- Maintain public confidence in the co-operative movement.

The **main functions** of MCSC are:

- Register and revoke registration of co-operatives;
- Supervise and regulate co-operatives;
- Create conducive environment for co-operatives to conduct their activities;
- Encourage and promote development of co-operatives;
- Promote co-operative awareness; and
- Foster co-operative values and principles.


